- Writing Essay: 30 min.
- Perfect score 36
- Students select which score reports(s) to send to colleges
- Pre-ACT: PLAN (10th)
- Includes Career Interest Inventory

- Critical Reading, Math, Writing
- Accepted nationally (All CA colleges & Ivy Leagues included)
- Reasoning
- Penalty for wrong answers
- Math grid-ins
- Basic Fee: \$45.00
- Writing Essay: Mandatory first
- Writing Essay: 25 min.
- Perfect score 2400
- All scores reported to colleges
- Pre-SAT: PSAT (11th)
