- 1 year, 4-8 hours a week commitment

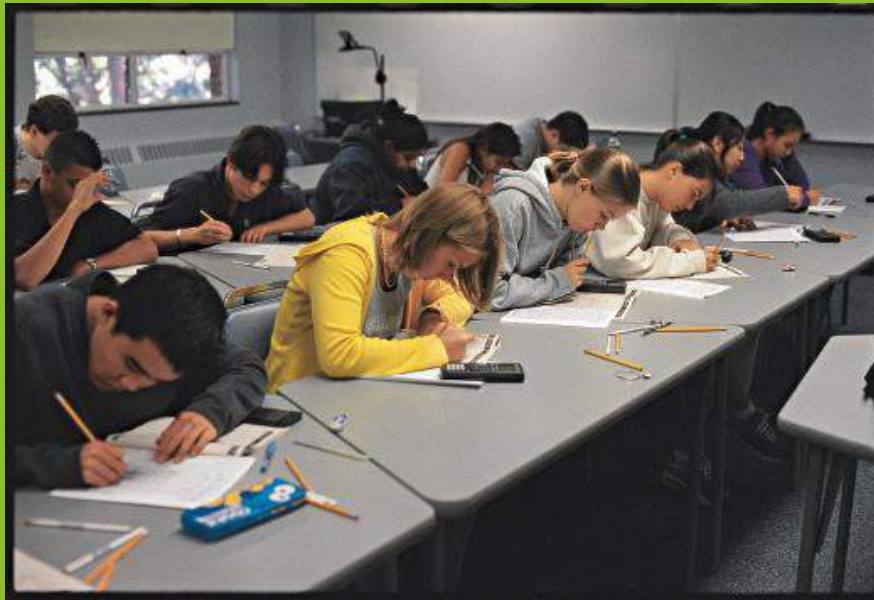

- **Curriculum-based**
- No penalty for guessing
- All multiple-choice
- Basic Fee: \$32
- Writing Essay: **Optional - last** (add \$15.00)
- Writing Essay: 30 min.
- Perfect score 36
- Students **select** which score reports(s) to send to colleges
- Pre-ACT: **PLAN (10th)**
- Includes Career Interest Inventory

SAT

- Critical Reading, Math, Writing
- Accepted nationally (All CA colleges & Ivy Leagues included)
- **Reasoning**
- Penalty for wrong answers
- Math grid-ins
- Basic Fee: \$45.00
- Writing Essay: **Mandatory - first**
- Writing Essay: 25 min.
- Perfect score 2400
- All scores reported to colleges
- Pre-SAT: **PSAT (11th)**

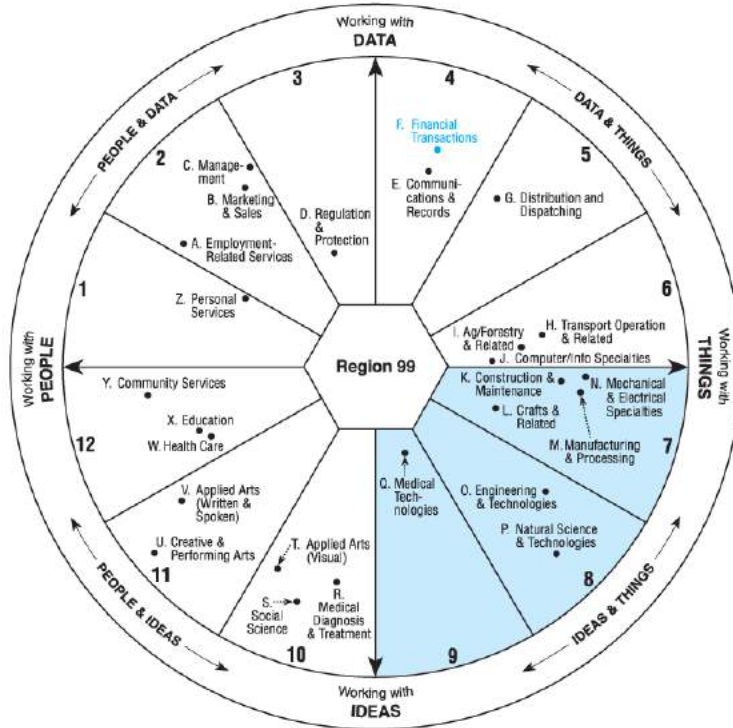
